


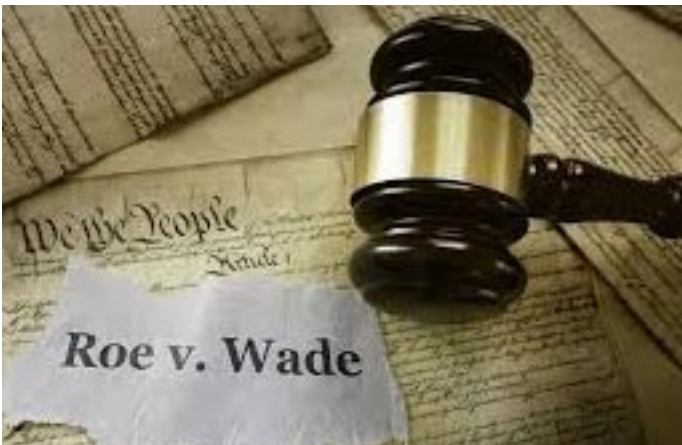
Ivy Tech Launches Entrepreneurship And Innovation Program This Fall

EVANSVILLE, Ind. – Ivy Tech Community College today announced a new school at the Evansville campus, designed with programming to give students the skills they need to become entrepreneurs and innovators. The Garatoni School of Entrepreneurship & Innovation will launch this fall, and the first cohort of students is now being filled.
The school has been named for South Bend Businessman Larry Garatoni and his wife Judy, following a \$2.5 million gift to the college. Garatoni has owned and managed a dozen companies in health care, information technology, and digital commerce over a 40-year business career. He is also the founder of the Career Academy and the Success Academy charter schools in South Bend.
The School was launched in partnership with Regional Innovation and Startup Education (R.I.S.E.). It will initially offer a certificate in as little as two semesters or a technical certificate in a year. Eventually, the Evansville campus plans to offer an Associate of Applied Science degree in entrepreneurship, as well. The programming is open to current students who may also be earning a degree in a different program; as well as new students, small business owners, and others, who may want a stand-alone credential.
“The program will offer practical skills individuals can use immediately in areas such as marketing, finances, human resources and legal considerations,” said Ivy Tech Chancellor Daniela Vidal. “My husband and I know firsthand the challenges that business owners face and the value of having a practical education and a mentor network to convert ideas into profitable businesses.”
According to the Small Business Administration, within the first five years, about half of all small businesses fail. Common reasons include inadequate funding, poor planning and management missteps. In Indiana, there are more than half a million small businesses and they employ more than 1.2 million people.

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Area Lawmakers Pledge Support To Overturn Of Roe v. Wade

STATEHOUSE Area lawmakers said they plan to support further protections for the unborn and expanded resources for pregnant women in the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade on Friday.
State Reps. Wendy McNamara (R-Evansville), Cindy Ledbetter (R-Newburgh) and Tim O'Brien (R-Evansville) said the nation's highest court rightfully returned the question of abortion back to the states by overturning Roe. Indiana lawmakers are expected to take action to further protect life when they return to the Statehouse for a special session. Gov. Eric Holcomb recently announced his call for lawmakers to reconvene on July 6 and provide \$1 billion in inflation relief to Hoosier taxpayers due to higher-than-expected revenue collections.
"Today's court ruling gives the General Assembly the opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to life," McNamara said. "While it's too early to know what possible legislation could look like, I look forward to discussing this important issue with my House colleagues and taking action to strengthen protections for the unborn."
In March, McNamara, Ledbetter and O'Brien signed onto a letter urging Gov. Eric Holcomb to

CenterPoint To Build Natural Gas Turbines

CenterPoint Energy, Inc. (NYSE: CNP) today announced its Indiana-based electric utility business, CenterPoint Energy Indiana South, received approval for the construction of natural gas generation from the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC), a key step in the company's long-term electric generation transition plan. CenterPoint Energy intends to construct two natural gas combustion turbines (CTs) to replace portions of its existing coal-fired generation fleet. The company's generation transition plan will significantly evolve the way the company generates power for its 150,000 customers across southwestern Indiana by combining a cleaner portfolio of renewables and complementary natural gas.
The estimated \$334 million natural gas facility will provide an output of 460 megawatts (MW), sized appropriately to reliably support the anticipated electric generation needed upon the retirement of A.B. Brown units 1 and 2 in late 2023. The CTs will be constructed at the current site of the power plant in Posey County, Ind., and will assist CenterPoint Energy in delivering on its commitment to provide a cost-effective, well-balanced energy mix.
The company's 2020 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) illustrated a preferred portfolio including nearly two-thirds of energy generated from renewable resources as well as natural gas generation, which is projected to ultimately save electric customers an estimated \$320 million over the 20-year planning period. Through the IRP process, CenterPoint Energy performed significant analysis and considered public input to arrive at the most reliable and cost-effective solution for customers.
“Although the majority of the proposed generation outlined in our plan comes from renewable resources, there remains a need for reliable, resilient and fast-ramping generation to operate around-the-clock when the sun and wind are insufficient to power the renewable resources,” said Steve Greenley, Senior Vice President, Generation Development. “While the combustion turbines may not run constantly, it is very likely they will operate several hours each day in order to supplement our renewable generation with a lower carbon solution, when renewable facilities are not at peak generating levels.”
In addition, the company recently filed for securitization of its A.B. Brown assets,

Senator Todd Young Steps Up

INDIANAPOLIS—Political courage is a rare commodity these days

When an elected official demonstrates it, he or she deserves commendation.

U.S. Sen. Todd Young, R-Indiana, did so the other day. He was one of 14 Republican senators voting in favor of the compromise gun-safety bill moving through the U.S. Senate.

More important, he was one of only two GOP senators—U.S. Sen. Linda Murkowski, R-Alaska, is the other—currently running for re-election to vote in favor of the measure.

Young's vote isn't likely to help him with the Republican base.

There is a significant slice of the Indiana GOP that believes the best solution to America's epidemic of gun violence is no solution at all. Given their druthers, these folks would arm toddlers



with assault weapons as they send them off to day care because they believe there is no question confronting society for which making guns even more abundant does not provide the answer.

More rational souls can shake their heads in wonder at such deeply entrenched delusions, but the fact is that gun worshippers vote. Often, they are single-issue voters who live to punish those politicians they

think have strayed from the true faith.

They can be particularly hard on fellow Republicans, whom they see as apostates. Not all that long ago, they threw over the late U.S. Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Indiana—for whom Young once worked—in part because they felt Lugar hadn't shown sufficient devotion at the altar of the divine firearm.

They did this even though Lugar had given the GOP and the

state more than 50 years of tireless service. They did it even though throwing Lugar overboard created the only possible opening for a Democrat to win the seat, which did happen when Joe Donnelly won in the fall 2012 election.

The firearms firebreathers didn't care. Sending a message that refusing to vote the National Rifle Association line all the time every time would not be tolerated was more important than holding onto a seat in the U.S. Senate.

That was a decade ago.

Since then, the gun lobby's fervor regarding firearms laws has become far less reasoned and far more fevered, thus heightening the risks for Republican politicians who opt to show judgment, independence and ... courage.

Yes, courage.

Young knows what happened to Lugar. He worked in Lugar's

Mitch Daniels Should Embrace Destiny's Call

INDIANAPOLIS—Now that Mitch Daniels has decided to step down as president of Purdue University, the U.S. House of Representatives Jan. 6 Select Committee has made clear that there's a retirement project waiting for him.

He can try to return his political party—the Republican Party—to sanity.

He may be one of the few people who can.

The committee hearings thus far have revealed just how much work Daniels would have to do if he took on the task. Those hearings have demonstrated that much of the GOP has coalesced around a series of lies and that it serves no principle or purpose greater than its individual members' immediate political self-interest.

Most Republicans are so terrified of the wrath of former President Donald Trump that they're willing not only to swallow but to spout whatever falsehoods and other delusional prattle dribble from his lips. To placate him, they, again and again, have violated

longtime core conservative values of free trade, individual liberty, and scrupulous devotion to the rule of law.

When they talk off-the-record about Trump, many Republicans make clear that they can't stand the man. Privately, they consider him a con artist, a bully and a coward, a damaged figure whose tethers to reality range from negligible to non-existent.

But they also know that Trump commands a significant public following, and that the untethered, unbalanced nature of his being makes him dangerous to confront. He is the sort of guy who will tear everything down to keep someone else from, as he sees it, beating him.

If he loses, everyone has to lose.

That's why so few Republicans, despite their reservations about the man and his character, have been willing to challenge the former president.

U.S. Sen. Mitt Romney, R-Utah, and U.S. Rep. Liz Cheney, R-Wyoming, have been the notable exceptions.

But Romney can afford to do so because he's sitting on a personal fortune that may be larger than Trump's and he serves a state where the Rom-

ney family name looms large.

Cheney is a different story.

Although she, too, has a renowned political pedigree, unlike Romney, she is closer to the beginning of her political career than the end. Her principled opposition to Trump is at the very least likely to temporarily derail her career—and it may destroy it.

That is what makes her a true profile in courage.

Neither Romney nor Cheney, though, has the intellectual heft that Daniels does.

During his eight years as Indiana's governor, Daniels established the Hoosier state as a kind of laboratory for conservative governance. No other public figure of his time or any time that has followed has been the idea generator that Daniels was in office.

He also didn't shy away from tough fights. A believer in honestly balanced budgets, he was willing to support modest tax increases if they were accompanied by deeper spending cuts. He understood that politics was the art of achieving the possible.

He and I often disagreed.

Some of those disagreements were big ones over important questions. Doubtless, we will continue to have differences of opinion.

But I always have respected both his intellect and his intellectual honesty.

That's because our debates were always about ideas, about the ways facts could be interpreted—not whether facts even matter. I inevitably found that, when I considered one of his ideas or plans from his perspective and started with his set of assumptions, I ended up in the same place that he did.

When we did differ, it was because I questioned his premise.

His logic was always flawless from that point forward.

Aside from his intellectual qualifications, Daniels also has his own impressive political pedigree. An heir of sorts to the legacies of both President Ronald Reagan and longtime U.S. Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Indiana, he has solid credentials both as a movement conservative and a pragmatist who can get things done.

He's in his early 70s now, but he's still younger than Trump, current President Joe Biden or Romney, for that matter.

Doubtless, Daniels feels—with justice—that he's put in his time and has earned a chance to retire in peace.

Destiny, though, often demands much of people with the talents such as Daniels possesses and denies such people respite, even when they have earned it.

Right now, destiny is asking Mitch Daniels if he has at least one more good fight left in him.

Templeton Named Top Forensic Scientist

Indianapolis, IN-The Indiana State Police Forensic Scientist of the Year Award is presented annually to a Forensic Scientist within the Laboratory Division deemed to have consistently provided a superior quality forensic analysis service in a highly professional, proficient, and unbiased manner for the Indiana Criminal Justice Community. The recipient of the 2021 Indiana State Police Forensic Scientist of the Year is Mitzi C. Templeton, whose accomplishments during



that year are worthy of such recognition and have earned her this award.

In 2021, Templeton, who serves as a Forensic Scientist in the Forensic Firearms Identification Unit at the Evansville Regional Laboratory completed 435 cases, which was well above the Unit's average, and she organized several Integrated Ballistics Identification System shoots with multiple agencies that involved 147 cases.

In September 2021, Templeton received a United States Attorney's

Award that was presented to her by the Office of the United States Attorney, Southern District of Indiana, "...in recognition of your invaluable contribution to the mission of the United States Attorney's Office and the United States Department of Justice." The award noted that Ms. Templeton was recognized for the forensic science services she completed as part of a significant criminal investigation, reading in part "...for exemplary public service performed during a joint State and Federal investigation and prosecution for unlawful possession of firearms and murder. Your dedicated work shows how State and Federal Investigators and Prosecutors can successfully unite to seek justice and protect the people of Indiana."

Templeton is a member of the As-

sociation of Firearm and Toolmark Examiners (AFTE), the International Association for Identification (IAI), the Indiana Chapter of IAI and the American Board of Criminalists (ABC), in which she is recognized as a Comprehensive Criminalist Fellow. She also serves as a website moderator for AFTE, as well as the Committee Chair of the AFTE Firearm and Ammunition Recall Committee.

Templeton graduated from Indiana University in 2006 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry. She started her career with the Indiana State Police Laboratory Division in May of 2007 at the Evansville Regional Laboratory, where she continues to serve.

Forensic Scientist Templeton resides in the Greater Evansville area.

Why Did Russia Choose To Invade Ukraine?

Why did Russia invade Ukraine on February 24, 2022? It appears wrong, unnecessary and self-destructive. Why did Russia invade Georgia in 2008 and 2014 and why does it occupy 20% of Georgia now? Why did Russia invade and annex Crimea in 2014? Why is Russia currently attempting to take over the Donetsk and Luhansk regions that are a part of Ukraine?

Russia is losing thousands of its soldiers, spending many billions, probably trillions, of its rubles, incurring harsh economic sanctions, affecting the world's grain supply and causing catastrophic harm to Russia's international relations. Why would it act in a way that appears to be so irrational?

Why is Vladimir Putin, President of Russia, and virtually a dictator in Russia's autocratic political system, so fixated on bringing the one-time members of the pre-1991 Soviet Union back into a unified Russia? There are many important distinctions between the Russia of today and the United States of 1861 as well as between Abraham Lincoln and Putin. But, as it often is, it might be instructive to look to history to help us understand our contemporary situation.

When it comes to contrasting



Lincoln and Putin we look to Putin's ruthlessness versus Lincoln's generosity of spirit as exemplified in his Second Inaugural Address as the American Civil War was coming to an end:

"...[W]ith malice toward none, with charity for all ..."
March 04, 1865

And although Lincoln was magnanimous while Putin is vindictive, they both had a vision of an undivided country. With Lincoln the preservation of the Union was the paramount issue. Putin sees the reconstituted Soviet Union the same

way. Lincoln had war brought to him by the South's firing on Fort Sumpter on April 12, 1861. Putin has been the aggressor against Ukraine, Georgia, Crimea, Donetsk, and Luhansk.

While Putin rails against the Nazis he claims are enslaving former Russian citizens as an excuse to invade, Lincoln was helping to bring actual slavery to an end. In other words, we must not attempt to equate Lincoln and Putin or Civil War America with today's Russia. Such a false narrative would not only be wrong, it would not help us under-

stand the political reality between Russia and its neighbors. On the other hand, an analogy comparing and contrasting Lincoln's passionate drive to preserve the Union might help us understand and, therefore, better combat Putin's passion to reunite the Soviet Union. It might also help us prepare for any possible further military expansion by Russia against other countries in the region.

We see Putin as an aggressor but he may have deluded himself into a self-image as a liberator and uniter. Perhaps we should more objectively study Putin's motivations. As the great Chinese military philosopher Sun Tzu (c. 544-496 BC) instructed: the supreme art of war is to know yourself and your enemy. If we better understand Putin, we might better either help defeat him or even have him change his general goal of hegemony over his previous countrymen who now wish to remain free and independent of Russia's control.

During 2021, Trp. Rasala was assigned to the day shift at the Lowell Post, specializing as a member of the All Crimes Policing (ACP) Team. Trp. Rasala is a Field Training Officer (FTO), a member of the Mobile Field Force (MFF), and background investigator. In 2021,

Trp. Rasala had 1026 traffic contacts, 135 criminal arrests (70 of which were for felony crimes). In addition to regular patrol duties, Trp. Rasala seized over 1200 lbs. of illegal drugs to include cocaine, methamphetamine, crack, ecstasy, heroin, marijuana, and prescription drugs; 25 firearms and more than \$340,400 in U.S. currency. Trp. Rasala accomplished all of this while also taking routine calls for assistance including 321 police services and 33 crash reports. The District #1 Law Enforcement Council also recently recognized Trp. Rasala for his exemplary service in 2021.

which was contingent on the IURC approval of the natural gas CTs and may result in up to \$60 million in additional savings to customers over the same time period.

"Today's approval will have no immediate impact on customer electric bills," added Greenley. "The recovery of the investments associated with the CTs will be requested through a future electric rate case. When combining the

savings to be realized through securitization and other bill reductions associated with the added renewable investments, the average residential customer is estimated to see a bill impact of less than \$10 per month for the total generation transition."

The replacement of most of the company's coal-fired generation will help mitigate costs associated with compliance of ever-evolving environmental regulations and the higher oper-

ating costs of continuing to run the aging units. By replacing much of the coal-fired generation with significantly more efficient technologies like renewables, including a large percentage of universal solar, the replacement will move CenterPoint Energy significantly forward on achieving its goal of net zero on direct carbon emissions by 2035.

Evansville Revises Water Bill Relief Program

JULY 2022

Evansville, Ind. – The Evansville Water and Sewer Utility (EWSU) has made two important changes to the Bill Relief Program previously announced: The monthly credit is increasing from \$3 to \$10 a month, and the eligibility requirements have been revised to exclude County residents. The changes stemmed from the Evansville City Council's approval on use of the City's allocation of American Rescue Plan funds. Current Bill Relief Program guidelines are as follows:

Who's Eligible

EWSU customers who reside

in City limits with an active water account and have a household income of \$50,000 or less may qualify for assistance.

What the Bill Relief Program Provides

C u s - tomers who apply for the program and qualify will receive a \$10 monthly credit ap-



plied to their account each month for one year – for a total savings of \$120. The credit offsets the 2022 water rate increase that goes into effect July 1. After one year, customers may have the opportunity to reapply for the program for an additional 12 months or while

funds last.

When It Takes Effect

The Bill Relief Program launches July 1, 2022, to help income-eligible individuals and families in the community lighten the cost of their utility bill. Applications are being accepted now.

Senate office and clearly sees Lugar's career as a model of service. Senate tradition allows a newly elected senator to choose another senator, current or former, to introduce him to the body. Young opted not to have the man he was succeeding, former U.S. Sen. Dan Coats, R-Indiana, perform that service. Instead, he asked Lugar to do it. When I asked Young afterward if he was sending a signal by doing so, he answered with one word. "Yes."

Then he explained that he wanted to honor Lugar's years of service to Indiana, the country and the world—and, just as important, he thought Lugar's approach to being a senator was one to emulate. The times haven't made that easy. We live in one of the most partisan ages in U.S. history. Americans now spend more time screaming at each other than they do talking with each other. Lugar thrived in an era in which it

was easier to serve as an honest broker. During his years in the Senate, genuine differences of opinion weren't treated as either personal insults or examples of blasphemy. Young often has had to bow and trim with the political winds. It is no easy thing to be a Republican in what is now Donald Trump's GOP. But I've always found Young to be a thoughtful guy, one willing to listen to and honestly consider views different from his own. In today's political environment, that's a quality that's rarer than it should be. Todd Young won't please the most rabid part of the Republican base with his vote on guns. And the realities of the day mean he isn't likely to attract any Democratic votes with it. But perhaps he didn't make a political calculation when he cast his vote. Perhaps he did so just because it was the right thing to do. That's not the most original motivation for doing something. But it's still the best.

call a special session should the Supreme Court overturn Roe v. Wade. Click here to view and download the letter.

"The right to life is first among human rights," Ledbetter said. "Our laws should recognize the advances in science, which prove the unborn deserve the same protections as all Americans. This rightful ruling allows us to take action to further preserve the sanctity of life, and increase support for new and expectant mothers."

"I'm ready to join my fellow legislators in carefully weighing the best course of action to continue Indiana's track record of protecting life at all stages," O'Brien said. "I also believe we need to do more to ensure pregnant women have access to resources and support to care for their babies."

Further details of the special session have not yet been announced and legislation has not been released. However, the General Assembly is expected to vet any legislation regarding abortion through the full legislative process, including hosting committee hearings and public testimony. Updates will be posted to the Indiana General Assembly's website at iga.in.gov.

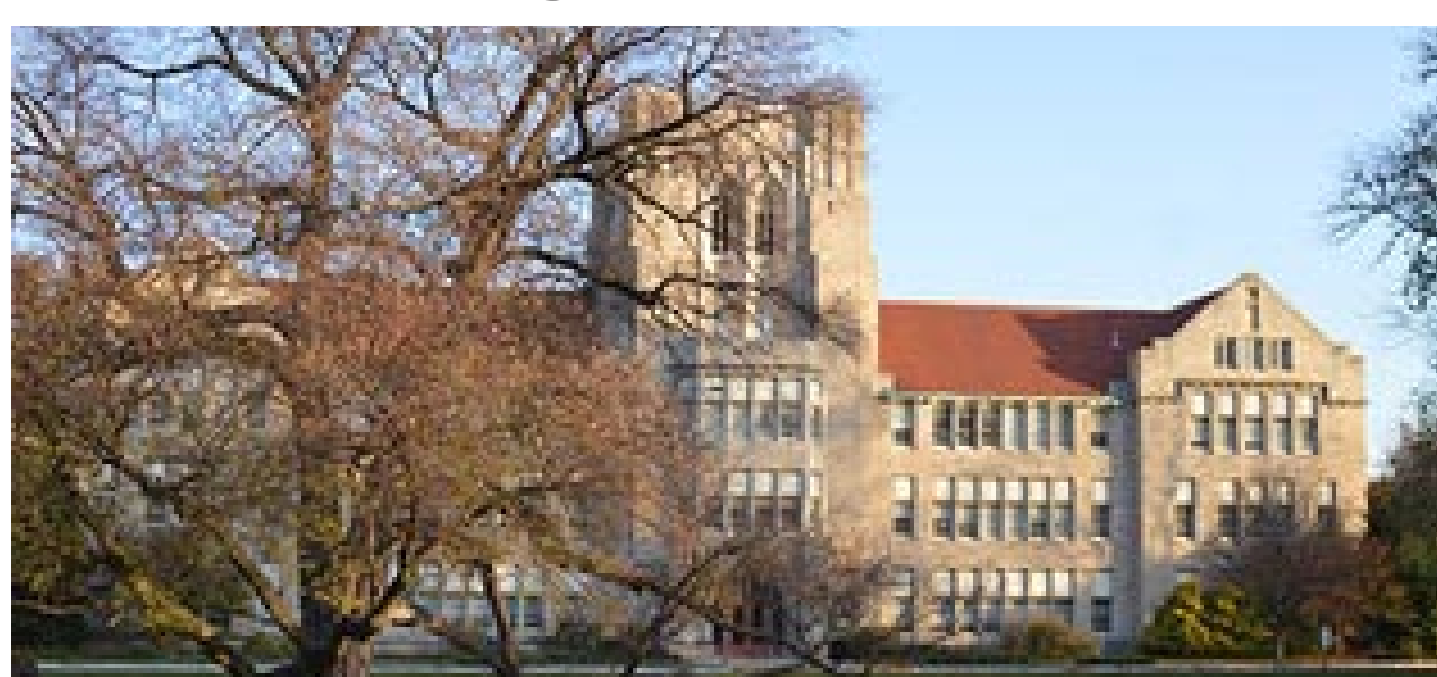
UE Invests Two As Wargel Endowed Chairs

UE To Host MVC Volleyball Championship

EVANSVILLE, Ind. – For the first time, the Missouri Valley Conference Volleyball Championship will be coming to Evansville. Meeks Family Fieldhouse will be the site of the 2022 championship site in November.

Set to take place from November 20-23, the championship will feature the top eight finishers from the regular season standings. Two matches will take place on the opening three days before the championship is played on the 23rd.

"Having the MVC tournament in Evansville for the first time in history is a huge step for our program," UE head volleyball coach Fernando Morales exclaimed. "Our program has been growing over the last several years as well as the sport of volleyball in the Evansville area. Having the top eight teams from one of the best conferences in the nation will help volleyball in Evansville to continue to grow."

"I am excited about this season and the tournament in November. See you in Meeks!"

Since taking over as head coach in 2019, Morales has directed the Purple Aces to two MVC Championship appearances in three seasons. Prior to his arrival, the program did not make the tournament since 2008. Last fall, the Aces finished with 21 victories, marking their first 20-win campaign since 1988.

UE was invited to the National Invitational Volleyball Championship



(NIVC) for its first postseason appearance since the early 1980s and first as a member of the MVC.

"This is such an exciting announcement for our athletics department as well as the Evansville community as a whole," UE Director of Athletics Dr. Kenneth "Ziggy" Siegfried stated. "Coach Morales has taken our program to new heights while actively working to grow the sport in our community."

"Around the nation, the Missouri Valley Conference is recognized for its volleyball success and to be able to host the championship at our facility is a testament to the hard work by our entire staff," Siegfried continued. "We have so much positive

momentum right now and this only adds to that excitement."

Meeks Family Fieldhouse was renovated prior to the 2017 season and the finished product was one of the top Mid-Major facilities in the country. Investing close to \$1 million into the facility, UE was the first program in the MVC to utilize the Taraflex floor, which is the official floor surface of the Olympics. Other upgrades included a videoboard, bleacher seating and LED boards on both sides of the floor, chairback seating, and an enhanced sound system.

USI Softball Finishes Season Ranked No. 6

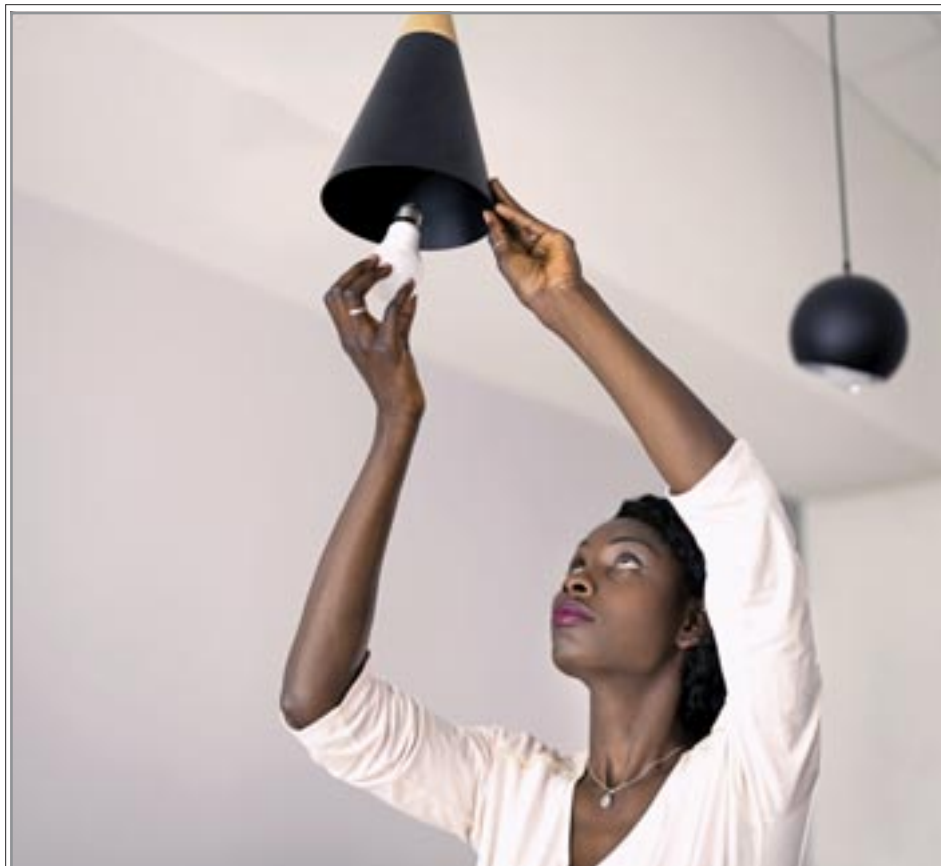

EVANSVILLE, Ind.—University of Southern Indiana Softball landed at No. 6 in the final National Fastpitch Coaches Association Division II Top 25 Poll, which was released last week by the NFCA.
The Screaming Eagles finished their final year at the Division II level with a 49-13 overall record and 26-2 mark in Great Lakes Valley Conference play. USI won the GLVC regular-season and GLVC Tournament titles before capturing its third NCAA II Midwest Re-

gion title—all since 2017.
USI Head Coach Sue Kunkle was named the GLVC Coach of the Year for the third time, while USI's coaching staff was named the NCAA II Midwest Region Coaching Staff of the Year by the NFCA for the third time.
The Eagles, who are earning their second-highest national ranking to finish a season in program history—they were ranked No. 1 after winning the national championship in 2018—lost to eventual national champion Rogers State University (Okla-

homa) in the opening round of the NCAA II Softball Championship. They fell in the elimination game to then No. 1 University of Texas at Tyler.
USI is expected to bring back eight starters, including its top three pitchers, when it begins its first year at Division I and as a member of the Ohio Valley Conference.

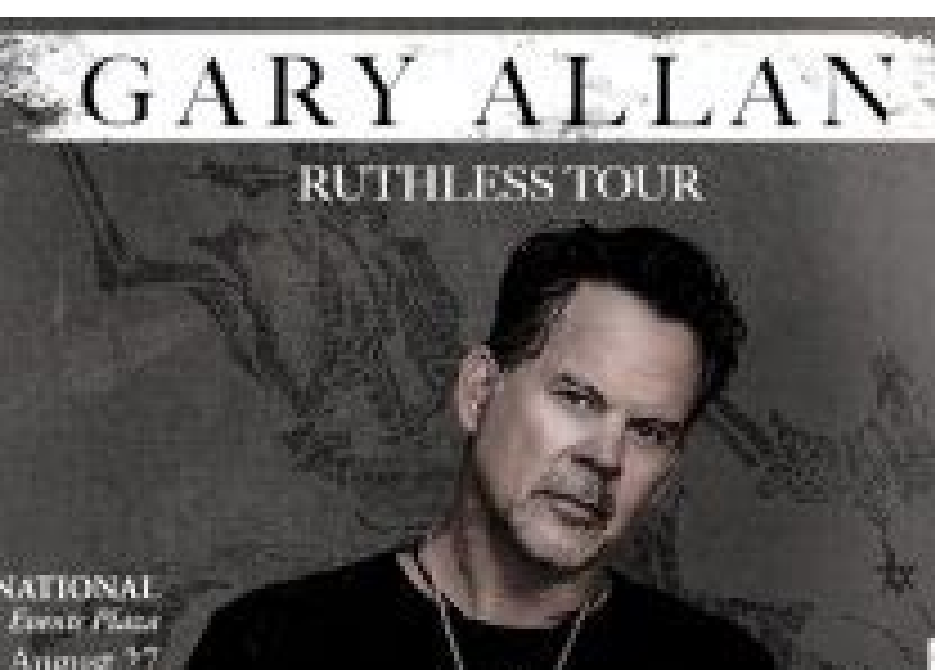
The convention committee also encouraged area residents to "join Us

Gary Allen Returns Aug. 27

Evansville, IN – American country music artist Gary Allan returns to the Old National Events Plaza on August 27 with The Ruthless Tour: 25 Years the Hard Way. Fans can expect to hear new music from Allan's new album 'Ruthless,' one he calls his most commanding work ever.

"This is a montage of everything I have done since my last album. It's what I love. I remain influenced by the '90s - as well as by the '80s. Twenty-six tracks were cut for this album. Then I went back to the studio and recorded three or four more tracks. Then I returned for two more. From each of these many sessions, I pulled out the cool stuff that I wanted on the record," Allan says of *Pathless*.

Allan made his country music debut with the release of his single 'Her Man,' leading to his gold-certified 1996 debut album 'I Used Heart for

Sale.' His second album, 'It Would Be You,' followed in 1998 and a third, 'Smoke Rings in the Dark,' was his first platinum album. He continued producing chart toppers like 'Alright Guy,' and 'See If I Care,' which were both certified platinum, while 'Tough All Over,' 'Greatest Hits,' and 'Living Hard,' all certified gold. His next two albums 'Get Off on the Pain,' and 'Set You Free,' both reached the Top 10 on the U.S. Billboard Top Country Albums charts.

Gary Allans' greatest hits albums have produced 26 singles on the U.S. Billboard Hot Country Songs and Country Airplay charts, including the number one hits 'Man to Man,' 'Tough Little Boys,' 'Nothing On but the Radio,' and 'Every Storm (Runs Out of Rain).' Allen has been nominated for this work by the American Country Awards, Academy of Country Music, and CMT Flameworthy Video Music Awards.

Straight No Chaser At ONEP Dec. 15

According to group member Steve Morgan, Straight No Chaser was formed during the 1996-1997 school year at Indiana University as a “way to meet girls.” The group eventually emerged at the forefront of the modern-day a cappella movement and has since garnered more than a billion streams, selling over three million albums and 1.5 million concert tickets worldwide.

"When we started Straight No Chaser as college kids at Indiana University, we never imagined that 25 years later, we'd have two albums certified gold and tour dates around the world," said group member Walter Chase. "What a ride it has been. It has literally been a dream come true."

In commemoration of "The 25th Anniversary Celebration," Straight No Chaser will release an exclusive NFT to mark the occasion. Additionally, PBS stations nationwide will air "Straight No Chaser: The 25th Anniversary Celebration" starting this

June. The concert features the nine group members performing classics like "Proud Mary," "Lean on Me" and "Twistin'," as well as pop mashups, like "I Intown Funk and Thriller"

Earlier this year, Straight No Chaser released a book of cocktail and food recipes, sharing family traditions with their fans. Straight No Chaser Sound Bites: A Cappella, Cocktails, and Cuisine, is a recipe book with personal family memories shared with the broader Chaser family. The book, published by Red Lightning Books (a sister company of IU Press), is available on Amazon, Barnes & Noble, Red Lightning, and Straight No Chaser's site.

Known for their soundtrack to the holidays, Straight No Chaser will release a physical version of last year's deluxe edition of *Social Christmasing* this fall. The album featured an original, "Christmas Show," written by group member Mike Luginbill and "Celebrate Me Home," featuring Kenny Loggins, in addition to the album's original tracklist which includes their signature twist on Christmas classics like "Silver Bells" and "Frosty The Snowman," five new original songs, and a hopeful take on the Counting Crows classic "A Long December."

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
