Bigger Than Barnum & Bailey

As the joke goes, if you elect a clown, you should expect to see a circus.

The big-top free-for-all in the U.S.

House of Representatives demonstrates that a circus is exactly what the national Republican Party has become.

The GOP at the federal level is peopled with and, in many ways, dominated by—cluelessly tragicomic performance artists who think striking poses is

the same as striking blows. They not only have no intention of ever governing—because governing means taking responsibility and accepting accountability for one's actions—but they're also not really serious about winning.

If they were, they wouldn't have timed their ouster of U.S. Rep. Kevin McCarthy, R-California, to drown out any attention that might have been paid to Hunter Biden's first day in court. Republican strategists have been working for months to make the president's surviving son the poster boy, not just for Joe Biden's administration, but for the Democratic Party as a whole. But, seeing a chance to steal the spotlight one more time for their antics, U.S. Rep. Matt Gaetz, R-Florida, and his little band of deep thinkers made history by toppling a speaker

in U.S. history.

And they let the younger Biden plead not guilty to three charges of possessing a firearm illegally in relative quiet.

> Thanks to Gaetz's prancing antics in the center ring, the GOP now is in complete disarray. After McCarthy was ousted, a microphone near the House floor caught a Republican member of the people's chamber asking plaintively, "What happens now?"

Good question.

McCarthy captured the speaker's post after years of maneuvering by selling his soul—and then a little bit more. He promised fealty to the most radical members of his caucus after being pushed through 15 humiliating votes to elect the House speaker—even though he was the only viable candidate.

His abasement of himself and his position bought him nothing but embarrassment and frustration, punctuated by the indignity of being the only leader of the House to be tossed overboard by his own party since America became a republic.

Now, no sane person would want the job, knowing that he or she was likely to be shown the same respect that a pinata at a child's birthday party typically receives.

Sanity, though, is not a prereq-

of their own party for the first time uisite for being a Republican member of the House, as Gaetz and crew have demonstrated. Someone will emerge from the snarling pack, unaware that the wolves inevitably will turn on him or her too as soon as the mood suits them.

That's because Gaetz and company raise money not by accomplishing anything, but by providing good theater. Nestled in safely gerrymandered districts around the country, they can do the most outlandish things secure in the knowledge that they cannot alienate their constituents. That frees them up to pitch unchecked and untethered nonsense-much of it dangerous nonsense—to like-thinking marks and rubes all around the country.

This was predictable.

In the interim between Donald Trump's election in 2016 and his inauguration of January of 2017, I had lunch with a Republican elder and a longtime Solon of the conservative movement.

I told him I thought Trump would end up destroying the Republican

He chuckled at my naivete about how the world and political power

Trump, he reassured me, would be a conventional GOP president, one who focused on providing tax cuts, deregulation and promotion of corporate interests. The wise men of the Party would bring him around and curb his excesses—sort of like wranglers gentling a horseand turn him into a typical Repub-

That didn't happen.

Instead, Trump turned on the party, driving out Republicans who voted with him 95 percent of the time because they weren't sufficiently "loyal." He chased away those—the Cheneys, the Bushes with much longer Republican pedigrees than he possessed.

If Ronald Reagan had living descendants who aspired to leaders in the GOP, Trump doubtless would have turned the firehose on them

Worse, he dragged into the party

hustlers, grifters and con artists such as Gaetz and his camp followers who realized that Trump had provided them with a whole new money tree to shake.

Traditional Republicans now are shocked at what their party has become.


They shouldn't be.



Braun, Carper Introduce Bill To Safeguard Tax Dollars

WASHINGTON - U.S. Senators Mike Braun (R-Ind.) and Tom Carper (D-Del.) introduced the bipartisan Safeguarding the Transparency and Efficiency Payments (STEP) Act, a bill that will continue to safeguard American tax dollars by building on the Senators' Payment Integrity Information Act of 2019, which was signed into law in 2020.

This new bill would designate all new federal programs making more than \$100 million in payments in any one fiscal year as "susceptible to significant improper payments" for their initial years of operation. It would also expand reporting requirements in an effort to combat and deter improper payments.



wasted billions of dollars in payments that never should have been made. More transparency and accountability should be required to prevent endless government waste that is bankrupting "For decades, Washington has our country." – Senator Braun

"The Payment Integrity Information Act has already begun working to save our country billions of dollars in improper payments. For years, I have worked to make it a priority across the federal government to root out and eliminate billions of dollars in waste, fraud, and abuse. Today, I'm proud to continue this critical work to increase the efficiency and transparency of federal spending and safeguard American taxpayer dollars." - Senator

FOOTNOTE: This bipartisan legislation is based on recommendations from the Government Accountability Office. During an April 2023 hearing before the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, U.S. Comptroller General Gene Dodaro highlighted the importance of these changes to current law and the impact they would have on agencies' ability to mitigate and recover improper payments more efficiently.

AG Rokita Warns Consumers Of Romance Scams

Attorney General Todd Rokita urges Indiana consumers to be on the lookout for romance scams approaching the holiday season.

"Online dating is a popular route for a lot of people these days in their search for true love," Attorney General Rokita said. "In some cases, innocent people are connecting with scammers who lie and cheat them out of their hard-earned money instead. Protecting Hoosiers from fraudsters is one of my office's top priorities."

In romance scams, perpetrators prey on unsuspecting matches by creating fake profiles to take advantage of victims online. They go to great lengths to pose as

prospective romantic partners relationship: with similar interests to lure people into providing gifts, sends a picture that doesn't look

money, or personal information.

Just this year, a Westfield resident lost nearly \$100 million to a romance scam. This type of dupery can happen even in Indiana. According to the FBI, victims of romance scams lost \$1 billion in 2021 alone.

Here are a few warning signs that someone might be more interested in your money or personal information

Your new romantic interest realistic. Rather, the

> person looks more like a model from a fashion magazine. The relationship is moving fast, and the

other person quickly professes their love for you. The person

tempts to isolate you from friends

The person requests inappropriate photos or financial information that could later be used

The person can't meet you in person or communicate on Facet-

The person asks you for money to buy their ticket to visit you, help pay for medical expenses (for them or a family member), or invest in a business.

The person tells you how to pay. He or she requires specific payment methods that are hard to recoup, such as a wire transfer, preloaded gift card, cryptocurrency, or money transfer app.

Concerning the current issue of rat problems in the city, if elected Mayor, I will immediately appoint a task force of professionals that will focus, first on cleaning up trash and areas that house rats, and hold Republic Services to the contract to ensure all trash is picked up. Then I will appoint a blue ribbon commission of professionals with a goal of eradicating the rats and provide a budget that will be sufficient to proactively address current and future infestations.

During a recent meet the candidates forum, a current city council member answered the question regarding what would be the ideal Mayor. She began to describe my experience to a tee. The description talked about business leadership with experience as a CEO, as well as financial background tied with business experience. As the CEO and President of Abstract Technology Group for 14 years, coupled with an MBA, I agreed with the assessment of the ideal mayoral candidate.

On day one as your newly elected mayor, I will request a full forensic audit from the State Board of Accounts. It is extremely evident to me as a former business person, that there are financial disparities with the Ford center after analyzing my Public Records requests. I ask you, if you are making \$35,000 per year, would any bank give you a loan for \$9,000,000.00? The Ford Center has a projected profit of \$35,000.00 at the end of 2023. Are you aware that the city council just approved a \$9,000,000.00 bond to upgrade the Ford Centers scoreboard and concession stands on behalf of Mayor Winnecke. We have many more important capital improvements that could use \$9,000,000, such as ensuring each police car is equipped with life saving equipment for citizens, usable parks, or drivable roads. 39 Hoosier Artists Strengthen Careers Through Fellowships From The Indiana Arts Commission



The home portion of the Ohio Valley Conference schedule features Tennessee State University (January 4), Tennessee Tech University (January 6), the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (January 18), Morehead State University (January 19), Western Illinois University (January 25), Eastern Illinois University (February 8), Southern Illinois University Edwardsville (February 10), Lindenwood University (February 29), and Southeast Missouri State University (March 2).

The Screaming Eagles have a

USI follows up the trip to Michigan State University (November 9) before starting play in the three-game Blue Devil Challenge with a visit to La Salle University (November 18). Gazda Kuhn recorded a kill that extended the lead to 17-10. From there, the Aces pulled away to take the set by a score of 25-15. Evansville wrapped up the frame on a 20-10 run.

Game 2 – SIU 25, UE 17

Things remained close throughout the opening half of the second set. Gazda Kuhn put Evansville in front by a 7-5 tally



while SIU posted four in a row to go up 9-7. Tied at 10-10, the Salukis scored five in a row to take control.

The Aces would get within three points when a kill from Madisyn Steele made it an 18-15 score, but SIU would fend off the challenge and utilize a 7-2 run to take the set by a 25-17 score.

Game 3 – SIU 25, UE 12

SIU jumped out to a 3-0 lead to open the third set and would

never give up the lead. UE got as close as one point at 5-4 before SIU embarked on a 10-2 run. They would go on to win the set by a final of 25-12.

Game 4 – SIU 25, UE 22

Another busy weekend is ahead for the University of Evansville women's golf team who travel to Peoria, Ill. for the Coyote Creek Classic.

Hosted by Bradley University, the event will be held on Oct. 7th and 8th at the par-72 Coyote Creek Golf Club. Action will begin on Oct. 7th in a shotgun approach at 8:30, followed by action on Oct. 8th starting at the same time.

The competition field includes Illinois State, Green Bay, Chicago State, Southern Indiana, Western Illinois, Northern Iowa, Bradley, and Purdue Fort Wayne.

Evansville is coming off a 7th-place finish at the Saluki Invitational earlier this week. Kate Petrova, Jane Grankina and Trinity Dubbs each posted their lowest scores at Dalhousie Golf Club. Petrova was the top finisher for the Aces, tying for 7th place. After identical rounds of 76 in the first day of action, Petrova carded a 2-over 74 in the final 18. Her 226 earned the top 10 finish.

Magdalena Borisova and Grankina were next up for Evansville, tying for




