The former vice president to Donald Trump and onetime Indiana governor had little choice but to leave the race for the White House.

His fundraising had dried up. His standing in the polls, even in those states where he campaigned hard, remained small, even diminutive.

There was a decent that Pence chance wouldn't even have qualified for the next Republican presidential debate, a fresh humiliation to be visited on a

man who had known so many of could persuade some of Jacobs' them in his political career.

That must have been hard.

When he tried to be, he never could sell the idea that he was seething with barely contained resentments. He never could make either friends or foes believe his rage was something to fear.

Worse, his attempts to move in the conservative cauldron of constant grievance made him seem disingenuous and inauthentic in an age that attracted to screaming incompetence, so long as it was genuinely practiced.

Enter Donald Trump.

I doubt Pence ever realized that signing on as Trump's running mate doomed whatever chance he had of making it to the Oval Office himself. Pence cleansed and blessed Trump's bid with the religious right, which gave Trump the narrow margin needed to secure the presidency.

In doing so, Pence traded away his own base—evangelicals now prefer the philandering former president to the devout former vice president—without gaining any footing with Trump's followers.

Worse, Pence spent four years abasing himself doing it, supplicating before a man he had to have known was neither a good president nor a good man.

A guy who could recognize and

appreciate, as Pence did, the integrity of Andy Jacobs also would know when that integrity wasn't

Now, after all the sacrifices, selfdenial and self-discipline, Mike Pence's dream has come crashing

There are those who take glee in his failure.

I'm not among them.

I didn't want him to be president, but I can't take satisfaction from a decent guy's disappointment.

And he is a decent guy.





Announced by the ICHE on November 3, the first grant cycle funding is being used to create 32 full-time positions at 22 public or private four-year Indiana higher education institutions to support 21st Century Scholars, Frank O'Bannon Grant recipients, minority students and other low-income and first-generation students.

has been \$180,000 to fund two full-time

Coaches. Coaches will be housed in the Pathways to College Program and will report to Dr. Brandi Neal, Director of Pathways to College Program. In their roles, coaches will assist in providing an immersive on-campus experience for first-generation college students, aimed at increasing matriculation to the institution. Coaches will also ensure the proportion of participants supported exceeds the state average of high school graduates who enroll in college.

"Today is First-Generation Colawarded lege Celebration Day, commemorating the signing of the Higher Education Act of 1965, which created federal financial aid and other programs that promoted access to higher education," says Dr. Shelly Blunt, Interim Provost. "This grant funding enables the University to provide essential wraparound support services for our first-generation students."

Funding for the College Success Program grant is made possible under House Enrolled Act 1001-2023. The initial program will run from November 1, 2023, through October 31, 2024, with opportunities to extend the grant pending review of the State Budget Committee.

"Last year, the Commission launched its strategic priorities to address college enrollment, completion and graduate retention," said Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education Chris Lowery. "The College Success Program is one of our intentional strategic approaches to partnering with institutions to address the challenges in the education to workforce pipeline and amplify the impact of proven programs such as the 21st Century Scholarship and Frank O'Bannon Grant. This will remove barriers that especially affect first-generation and lowincome students."




USI Theatre To Present Exit, Pursued by a Bear'

And just how far she'll go to even the score.

Billed as a "dark revenge comedy," the production balances the serious with the absurd. Gunderson's



story of abuse and escape is all too real for those survivors of domestic abuse. While extreme, Exit, Pursued by a Bear shows that there are creative ways to find your voice and a path to a better life. By placing her abuser in a position to be forced to

watch his sins be recounted, Nan gets a chance to extract a bit of catharsis mixed with revenge.

The Purple Aces welcome players from across the Midwest as part of their 2024 class. UE's latest group of signees includes two point guards and two shooting guards from Indiana, Illinois, and Kentucky.

"We hit a home run with this recruiting class!" says Head Coach Robyn Scherr-Wells. "This group compliments our current freshmen class and helps us ensure we are building the right way for the future. These four players are all very skilled guards who can shoot, score at the rim, and play in our press and up-tempo offense. They all share qualities of being intense competitors, being in great shape, being high character individuals, and being excellent students,".

The Aces first player to verbally commit in the spring was 5'10" shooting guard Kylee Norkus. "Kylee has a non-stop motor and will be a great asset in our press and transition offense," says Scherr-Wells. "When Kylee committed to UE in the spring, I was already so excited about what she would bring to our program. And then I watched her game get better and better over the summer.

"She does the obvious things well like scoring in transition and getting to the rim and making shots, but it's all the little things that I get excited about. Her court vision and her ability to find her teammates grew so much in the past year. Her ability to rebound defensively and then lead the break fits perfectly for what we do. Her competitive drive and work ethic are phenomenal. She has gained great experience playing on the EYBL circuit and in a very competitive high school conference. Kylee will make an immediate impact at the wing for us!"

Norkus comes to Evansville from Neuqua Valley High School in Naperville III. Over her past three as a starter for the Wildcats, Norkus has been named All-Conference and All-Area in back-to-back years. She was also named to the IBCA All-State team last winter for her help in leading Neuqua Valley to a Regional Championship. Last season, Norkus averaged 16 points, seven rebounds, five steals, and four assists per game.

"I chose UE because of the phenomenal coaching staff to help me continue to grow and develop to my fullest potential athletically," says Norkus. "Evansville's community is extremely welcoming and supportive of their student-athletes. I'm looking forward to adding my contributions on and off the court for UE. I'm escstatic to be an ACE!"

UE welcomes a local recruit to its 2024 class in point guard Avery Kelley. Playing just down the street at Reitz Memorial High School, Kelley is staying home following three successful seasons



with the Tigers. "The first time I saw Avery play as a sophomore at Memorial, I knew she was a player we needed to keep home at UE," says Scherr-Wells. "The pace and tenacity at which she played as a young high schooler stood out to me. Avery has toughness and grit to go along with skill.

"She shoots the ball really well and has a good feel for how to create opportunities for her teammates as a point guard. She is a gym rat and comes from a family of athletes. She will set the tone of what it looks like to put the time into the gym. I am so excited she has chosen to stay home in Evansville!"

Along with playing basketball, Kelley is a multisport athlete having spent two years on the Tiger's softball team and one year on the track team. Over the past three years on the court, Kelley has been named an Indiana Jr. All-Star, a First Team selection for both All-Conference and All-Region and an All-State honorable mention. Last season, Kelley averaged 15 points per game with 4 assists, 5 rebounds, and 2 steals. Kelley comes from a family with a strong collegiate athletic background as both her parents' played basketball at Murray State in the late 1990s.

"I chose to play for UE because of the people," says Kelley. "The coaching staff and players all have enthusiastic personalities and a love for the game. I know I'm going to a great school with the ability to teach me new skills on and off the court.

"Being able to have my friends and family come to all my games and support me is another great factor. I'm super excited to be able to wear Evansville on my chest and play for the team I grew up watching and wanting to be part of!"

Evansville's third signee comes from the Bluegrass State in guard Logan Palmer. Palmer hails from Union, Ky. where she has been a four-year starter at Randall K. Cooper High School. "We had the opportunity to watch Logan grow as a player over 2 full years of recruitment," says Scherr-Wells. "It has been a joy to see her game improve and her confidence in herself grow.

improve and her confidence in herself grow.

"She is such a good athlete and watching her go from being a forward as a young player in high school to developing into her college position as a wing with her AAU team over the last year has

been really fun. Her shooting

range has grown so much and has made her a threat from all spots on the floor. She is just scratching the surface of what she can be as a basketball player. I think Logan was really underrated in the recruiting process and we are pumped that she has chosen to be an Ace!"

Last season, Palmer averaged nine points, three rebounds, 45% shooting from the floor, and 80.5% shooting from the free throw line. Palmer helped the Jaguars make a run to the Kentucky State Tournament Final Four in 2023 where they fell at Rupp Arena to Mercy High School. Along with making the Final Four in 2023, Palmer was a consistent starter in back-to-back region titles for Cooper where she was named to the District All-Tournament Team and an All-State Honorable Mention.

"I chose UE because it felt like family," says Palmer. "The coaching staff is backed up by an amazing team of loving girls who all have the same goal. Basketball is more than just a sport and UE displays just that.

"I truly believe UE will push, stretch, and mold me into the best version of myself on and off the court. I'm so excited to see all we have in store! Go Aces!!"

The Aces' final 2024 signee on National Signing Day is shooting guard Camryn Runner. Runner will join UE from Hamilton Heights where she is a four-year starter for the Huskies. "The more I watched Camryn this summer, the more I fell in love with her game," says Scherr-Wells. "Her Indiana Elite team on the Adidas cir-

cuit won a ton of games this summer, and she was a very important piece

portant piece. "I love that Camryn can play both the point and shooting guard. She plays with so much joy and toughness. She makes everyone around her better. I would sit courtside at her games and I could hear how well she communicates on the court, and the confidence she gives her teammates. She shoots the 3 really well. She is a player who can score when you need her to but also has no problem creating for and feeding her teammates. She is a natural leader and I cannot wait to see the impact she will have on

our campus!" Runner is a three-time All-State, All-Sectional, and All-Conference honoree as the Huskies have made three runs to regionals in class 3A. After three years, Runner is already a 1,000-point scorer having averaged almost 19 points a game while being 5th in the state in free throws with 157. Runner is also active on the club basketball circuit with Indiana Flight, a team that was a National Runner Up in the Adidas circuit over the summer. Along with playing basketball, Runner spends time on the Huskies golf

and track and field teams.

"I chose UE because of the welcoming environment I experienced on my visit," says Runner. "I could immediately tell the coaching staff and university had nothing but the best intentions for me. Another reason why I chose UE would be the education that I will receive for the next 4 years to set me up for my future career."

UE's Phillip, Hernandez Earn Postseason All-MVC Honors

ST LOUIS — Two members of the University of Evansville men's soccer team have been honored with post-season awards by Missouri Valley Conference Head Coaches.

Senior forward Kai Phillip and freshman midfielder David Hernandez were recognized for their play in the 2023 season for the Purple Aces by the MVC. Leading UE on offense, Phillip earned a spot on the All-Conference First Team after being named to the Second Team only a year ago. Hernandez finished his first season with Evansville as a consistent starter and stalwart for the middle four while being the Aces go-to for corner kicks on the right side.

This season, Phillip led UE in most statistical categories including goals (10), points (21), shots (36), shots on goal (17), and games started (16). At the end of the season, the forward ranked 28th in the nation in goals per game and 3rd in the Missouri Valley Conference, averaging 0.62 goals a game. He also was top of the



Valley in goals and points, sitting third behind MVC Player of the Year Dylan Sing and All-Conference First Team selection Charlie Sharp. Phillip was also only one of six players in the Valley to have multiple braces during the season. Phillip scored

two goals in a match against both Southern Indiana and Northern Illinois.

Hernandez in his first season with the Purple Aces played in all but one game and started 73% of the time. For the season, the midfielder recorded one goal against UIC and tallied three assists over the course of 15 games. Hernandez was sixth in minutes played for Evansville with 1,000 minutes on the pitch and led all freshmen and newcomers on UE's roster.

USI's Markland, Grafton Bring Home All-OVC Honors

EVANSVILLE – University of Southern Indiana Women's Soccer had two Screaming Eagles receive Ohio Valley Conference postseason honors on Wednesday. The league's head coaches and communication directors voted upon the postseason accolades.

It was announced that redshirt freshman goalkeeper Anna Markland (Hoover, Alabama) and sophomore defender Charli Grafton (Sunriver, Oregon) were recognized by the conference for their performances in 2023.

Between the posts, Markland was named the OVC's Goalkeeper of the Year along with being on the All-OVC First Team and All-Newcomer Team. In taking over the reins in goal, Markland started all 19 matches, posting a 1.11 GAA with 68 saves and six clean sheets in the regular season. Her six shutouts and 1.11 GAA ranked second in the OVC, while her saves total was top five. She also had a .782 save percentage. In conference play, Markland had a sub-1.00 GAA, 32 saves, and an OVC-best five shutouts, including three straight between October 5-12. Markland was a three-time OVC Goalkeeper of the Week during the season.



Commanding the defensive unit, Grafton earned All-OVC Second Team accolades. Grafton shifted from a holding midfield position in 2022 to the left centerback spot in 2023, leading an entirely new backline for USI this season. The sophomore helped USI to six shutouts in 2023 with five coming in OVC play. Grafton started

every match, playing all but 21 minutes this season. Getting involved offensively, Grafton also tallied an assist in USI's 3-0 win against Lindenwood University on October 8. Grafton was named OVC Defender of the Week twice during the 2023 campaign.

Southern Indiana concluded its 2023 season with a top-four seed and

a quarterfinal appearance in the Ohio Valley Conference Women's Soccer Championship Tournament. USI earned its second consecutive OVC tournament berth in the second year of the transition to Division I. The Screaming Eagles seek to continue to build and take another step forward in 2024.

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
